Palliser will introduce a new retirement celebration as part of its staff recognition dinner. The board voted unanimously to expand the celebration to retirees.

The board had earlier discussed the challenges of holding a dinner for staff across the geographically large division.

The details of the new staff celebration have yet to be determined.

New ad hoc committee created to address Master's agreement

The board will strike a new ad hoc committee to review and propose amendments to the master agreement with Master's Educational Society. The master agreement sets the terms for the alternative programs at Master's Academy and College in Calgary.

An earlier committee created in December 2015 and consisting of Trustees Craig Whitehead, Debbie Laturnus and Esther Willms met with Master's society representatives once but did not reach any conclusions.

The new committee will consist of Vice-Chair Debbie Laturnus, Alternative Vice-Chair Craig Whitehead and Central Office support as determined by Acting Superintendent Dr. Garry Andrews. Andrews, who previously served as mediator between Palliser and Master's, will act in an advisory capacity.

Terms of reference for the ad hoc committee will be considered at the next board meeting of March 14.

Changes to meeting schedule

The board will not schedule weekly meetings as it did in February. It did approve the holding a regular board meeting from 4 to 5:30 p.m., March 14, a date the trustees had already set aside for the second of three workshops with facilitator Dr. Terry Weninger. Those workshops are addressing review of policies in relation to the findings of the Palliser organizational review.

By the end of the March 14th meeting, trustees expect they'll have several draft policies available for public review and input. The polished drafts will be posted on the board's Policy Review webpage to provide stakeholders an opportunity to provide comment.

Several policies were discussed at the board's first workshop with Weninger Feb. 13-14.

The board also voted to reschedule its April 18 meeting to April 25. The earlier date fell in the Easter break.

Superintendent's contract ended
